The Editors

John Briggs, a Baptist layman, is currently emeritus professor of the University of Birmingham, UK, and senior research fellow and director of the Baptist History and Heritage Centre at Regent's Park College in the University of Oxford. He was principal of Westhill College of Higher Education from 1997 to 1999, and pro vice-chancellor of the University of Birmingham, Westhill, from 1999 to 2001. He has served on both the central and executive committees of the WCC, and acted as drafter of the report of its Special Commission on Orthodox Participation in the WCC.

Mercy Amba Oduyoye, a Methodist from Ghana, is director of the Institute of African Women in Religion and Culture of Trinity Theological Seminary, Legon, Ghana. She was on the faculty of the Department of Religious Studies, University of Ibadan, Nigeria, for twelve years, and has served as visiting faculty in theological institutions in Africa, Europe and North America. The Circle of Concerned African Women Theologians was founded on her initiative. Previous professional responsibilities include presidency of the Ecumenical Association of Third World Theologians, membership of the WCC's Faith and Order Commission, and seven years as deputy general secretary of the WCC.

Georges Tsetsis is Grand Protopresbyter of the Ecumenical Patriarchate. From 1965 to 1984 he served the WCC, first as secretary for the Middle East and later as deputy director of the Commission on Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service. From 1985 to 1999 he was permanent representative of his church to the WCC. After his retirement he directed the Orthodox Centre of Chambésy, Geneva, and its Institute of Post-Graduate Orthodox Theological Studies for a short time. From 1991 to 2001 he was a member of the WCC's central and executive committees of the WCC.

Hugh McCullum, an Anglican from Canada, is an author and journalist. After serving as editor of the two largest circulation church publications in Canada, he spent more than 14 years in Africa, first in southern Africa as a foreign correspondent, then in Kenya with the All Africa Conference of Churches, and finally in Zimbabwe as a correspondent for several overseas publications and in journalism training. He is the author and editor of 14 books and has had a long association with the WCC's department of Communication.
