His current research theme is Political Philosophy in the Vernacular between the Middle Ages and the Renaissance. Briguglia's main research interests are medieval and early modern political philosophy (starting with Augustine), the relationship between theology and politics in the Late Middle Ages, the metaphors of power, and the relationship between literature and political thinking.
